



Timeline – U.S. Experience








Ventilator Statement Drove Big Spike

Friday, March 27, ASAHQ.org saw the highest single day of traffic, generating 68,791 pageviews. The Joint Statement on Multiple Patients per Ventilator almost single-handedly caused that surge, with over 25k pageviews, a great majority of which came from Facebook and direct links (likely shared by email).

The Journal website has also seen historic traffic levels in March, peaking at 30,540 pageviews on Thursday, March 19, and almost topping that again on March 27, when the Journal site had 29,217 pageviews.

What should anesthesiologists be doing now to prepare for a surge?

- At the local level, assess your assets
 - Testing
 - ICU beds
 - Ventilators, BIPAP/CPAP, Anesthesia Gas Machines
 - Personal Protective Equipment
- Policies
 - PPE- who wears what and when
 - Patient screening and flow
- Planning
 - How to handle a surge and make new ICUs, repurpose anesthesia machines, redeploy anesthesia personnel to help in ICUs

Anesthesiologist leaders

- Understand your local and regional capacity, communicate with colleagues
- Determine who your regional and state leaders are and how you can communicate your needs in a timely manner
- Protect your staff, be the calm in the storm
- Overcommunicate- be willing to talk to everyone including the press who can help with the correct messaging to the public

Final Thoughts

- We have to manage two pandemics- COVID and fear
- Economics will be a continuing challenge
- This is a time that physicians and especially anesthesiologists can be the trusted voice and provide hope in managing critically ill patients with limited resources.
